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Randy Hertz is the Vice Dean of N.Y.U. School of Law and the director of the law school's clinical program. He has been at the law school since 1985, and regularly teaches the Juvenile Defender Clinic and a simulation course titled "Criminal Litigation." Before joining the N.Y.U. faculty, he worked at the Public Defender Service for the District of Columbia, in the juvenile, criminal, appellate and special litigation divisions. He writes in the areas of criminal and juvenile justice and is the co-author, with Professor James Liebman of Columbia Law School, of a two-volume treatise titled "Federal Habeas Corpus Law and Practice"; the co-author, with Professor Anthony G. Amsterdam of N.Y.U. Law School, of "Trial Manual for the Defense of Criminal Cases"; and the co-author, with Professor Amsterdam and N.Y.U. Law Professor Martin Guggenheim, of "Trial Manual for Defense Attorneys in Juvenile Delinquency Cases." He is an editor-in-chief of the *Clinical Law Review*. In the past, he has served as the Chair of the Council of the ABA's Section of Legal Education and Admissions to the Bar; a consultant to the MacCrate Task Force on Law Schools and the Profession: Narrowing the Gap; a reporter for the Wahl Commission on ABA Accreditation of Law Schools; a reporter for the New York Professional Education Project; and the chair of the AALS Standing Committee on Clinical Legal Education. He received NYU Law School's Podell Distinguished Teaching Award in 2010; the Equal Justice Initiative's Award for Advocacy for Equal Justice in 2009; the Association of American Law Schools' William Pincus Award for Outstanding Contributions to Clinical Legal Education in 2004; the NYU Award for Distinguished Teaching by a University Professor in 2003; and the American Bar Association's Livingston Hall award for advocacy in the juvenile justice field in 2000.
